UGC Community College: Advance Certificate Course in Sericulture

The college has upgraded and added to its existing infrastructure to run the above mentioned courses. Academic arrangements such as preparation of syllabus for the courses, provision for visiting faculties for the P.G. courses to supplement the permanent faculties etc. are made. B.P. Ed. And P.G. Diploma in Computer Applications is introduced to cater to the increasing demand of the student community. The college has received grant under UGC's Community College scheme and an Advance Certificate Course in Sericulture is introduced in view of the sociocultural background of the region where rearing silk worm is largely practiced. This programme is supposed to benefit the entrepreneurs and the traditional silk worm producers as well.

2.6 Innovative processes adopted by the institution in Teaching and Learning:

The learning process has been made student-centred in the college through the use of ICT tools, computer labs, virtual learning resource centre and updated labs, interactive learning through discussion, access to INFLIBNET and on-line databases. The thrust area identified in consonance with the NAAC guidelines is to effect a paradigm shift in the knowledge delivery system. We visualize a smooth transition to digital learning in the immediate future without sacrificing the strengths of the conventional class room. Steps have already been taken to provide maximum use of all the ICT facilities in the college. The College has provided computers to all the departments. New desktops and laptops are purchased and installed. New LCD projectors are installed in the College. Three high tech Digital Interactive Board is installed at the Department of Computer Science, Physics and Geography. Public Address Systems are installed at the big class rooms. Public Address Power Podiums are also installed. Wi Fi facility is provided in the college campus and audio-video facilities are also provided in general class rooms. The Net and ICT facilities enhance and enrich the teaching learning process. A state of the art Conference cum e-class room is developed.

#### 4.2 Computerization of administration and library

There are ten computers in the college office used for different purposes. Admission related works, fee collection, billing etc. and most of the administrative works are done with computers. College specific examination software has been installed and updated time to time for speeding up examination related works. Admission process and election process have already been computerized by developing specific software. For accounting purposes, Telly is used. New University Registrations are made through specific computer software supplied by the University. Student database is carefully maintained.

There are ten computers in the library. Three of those are used for data entry, one for scanning, uploading and down loading and five are for the use of the students. The College has automated all the processes of the Library. New computers are added to the Library under LAN with Internet browsing terminals. Local Area Network (LAN) using SOUL software has been installed for automating in-house activities and services of the library. INFLIBNET facility has been started.

#### 5. Student Support and Progression

#### 5.1 Contribution of IQAC in enhancing awareness about Student Support Services

The efforts of the IQAC to enhance awareness about Student Support Services results in the creation of a separate sports complex (Gymkhana) comprising of the Indoor Stadium, Basket Ball Court, Gymnasium Hall and the Sports Ground in a part of the college. Training programmes for sports and culture are organized periodically. A physical instructor was appointed for the benefit of the students. Career Counselling and Entry in service-training for recruitment to various jobs are organized by the respective cells. Anti ragging and Grievance Redressal cells are working actively. The IQAC has been playing a supporting and guiding role to all the bodies formed for student support. The IQAC ensures that information about these student support services is available in the college prospectus and the website.

#### 5.2 Efforts made by the institution for tracking the progression

North Lakhimpur College put sincere efforts for tracking the progression of the students. The constituent academic departments of the college maintain the tradition of keeping the record of their respective students each year. The Alumni Association too monitors the record of the students passing out of the college. # 6. Governance, Leadership and Management

#### 6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

Vision: The primary aspiration of North Lakhimpur College is to always look forward with a vision and elements of innovation. The College is committed to raise standards of higher education in this part of North Eastern India and for us, offering high quality teaching is more than just a priority- it is our raison d'etre. To be precise, we hope to devise a new equation for education in the near future: theory plus practical knowledge plus capacity to think.

Mission: The establishment of North Lakhimpur College was the outcome of the efforts and untiring zeal of a core group of far sighted persons in particular and the people of the north bank of the mighty Brahmaputra in general with the following goals and objectives in mind:

- 1. To impart higher education to the students of this backward region, so that economic backwardness or lack of communication could not retard the academic development of the region.
- 2. For socio cultural development of various ethnic groups of the region.
- 3. To create scientific temperament.
- 4. To provide employment avenue.
- 5. To promote gender equality.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

#### 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The academic autonomy of the college enjoyed from 2013 enables it to design its own framework for curriculum development. There is an Academic Council and Board of Studies for U.G. and P.G. courses to devise new syllabus and course structure for the Core and Elective subjects. Relevant and updated papers are introduced, some existing papers modified and upgraded to suit the interests of the students and the society at large. The Board of Studies of the various teaching departments comprising of subject experts and representatives from the corporate sector now sit at regular intervals to discuss issues related to curriculum enrichment and development. The various add on programmes like the Certificate programmes in Human Rights, Performing Arts, Travel & Tourism, Computational Chemistry enrich the knowledge base of the students.

#### 6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

North Lakhimpur College follows its own method for effective teaching and learning. The Academic Council prepares the academic calendar at the very beginning of the academic session. The schedule of teaching and examinations in the college are conducted in a planned manner guided by the Academic Calendar. All the departments prepare 'teaching plan' to conduct the course in an efficient manner. The college provides models, charts, slide projector, LCD projector, overhead projector, interactive board, podium etc. to boost up the teaching process. The students in some departments, where they required undertaking project work, self learning is encouraged. Such activities contribute to self management of knowledge development, skill formation in the student and provides requisite platform to the student to become confident and self reliant. The curriculum gives abundant freedom to the teacher to continuously and comprehensively keep track of the progress made by the students - for instance in addition to the compulsory Sessional tests a teacher can adopt other means like Group Discussion, Quiz, Debates & Symposium, Surprise Tests depending on feasibility and need. The tutorials are exhaustive sessions where the students can clear their doubts, if any, regarding the course content and over the years these sessions have proved to be a major boon for the slow learners. Debates after lessons and innovative teaching methodology enable students to grasp and analyze the subject instead of rote

learning. Students are assessed by intra-institutional evaluation methods of the institution, which can be outlined by taking into account the following test apparatus presented below.
UNIT TESTS: These tests are held every fortnight unless they are substituted by sectionals. The main aim of these tests is to keep the students rigorously in touch with the progress of the course. They are informed at the beginning of the session of the importance of these tests and cautioned against callousness that may result in poor assessment performance in the long run.
☐ SESSIONAL TESTS: Utmost care is taken to hold Sessional tests each month of the six taught months of the academic session. The scope of these tests is wider than the unit tests. They generally cover the course details of the entire month and the objective is to assess the progress of the students month wise.
□ STUDENT SEMINARS: There is a seminar session on every Saturday of a week. These seminars are basically centered on course-related areas that both the students and the teachers think worthwhile for more elaborate discussion. Free thinking, originality of thought and beauty of presentation are the three guiding principles of these seminars. Students are observed to be very keen on participation in these seminars and they find these seminars a democratic platform to engage themselves in intellectual debates of all kinds. Sometimes there are real expansions in these seminars to incorporate inter-disciplinary discussions to make the students aware of the connectedness of the seemingly isolated fields of study.
☐ HOME ASSIGNMENTS: Students are asked to do various writing assignments on daily basis. Each and every teacher is keen to get the students in line with the progress of the syllabus and assignments are given to them to practice those areas that need to be reinforced.

# 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Examination and Evaluation is done on a continuous basis by the Controller of Examinations under credit based semester system (CBSS) It has the following features:
☐ In CBSS students are assessed in two parts: i) Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) and ii) Semester End Examination (SEE). CIE is conducted by the course teacher all through the semester, which includes Sessional Examination I (written), Sessional Examination II (written), Seminar,/Group Discussion/ Home Assignment/ Sudden Test/ Quiz along with attendance in class. SEE is conducted at the end of the semester, on dates fixed by the Controller of Examinations.
$\ \square$ A student is allowed to appear in the end semester examination only if i) he or she attends at least 80% of the lectures, practicals and tutorials and ii) secures the minimum marks required in internal assessment.
$\hfill\Box$ There is 25% marks for Internal Assessment and 75% marks for End Semester Examination.
After evaluation of answer scripts every teaching department notifies the marks secured by the examinees in the various courses of study. If not satisfied with the results an examinee can approach the teaching department concerned for re-evaluation through proper channel and the re-evaluation is done in the presence of the complainant. The motive of the college is to keep the examination and evaluation processes transparent.
☐ After the declaration of results of a semester, the Controller of Examinations issues a grade card to students. The grade card contains the grades obtained in the courses registered by him/her, the CGPA, SGPA and the total credits earned.
Once a student completes all the requirements of a programme the Controller of Examinations issues him/her a Transcript containing the list of courses completed by him/her with pass grades along with the final grades obtained in each, the total credits earned and the CGPA.
☐ Absolute Grading System is applied.
☐ The Parent University awards the degree to the students evaluated and recommended by North Lakhimpur College (Autonomous). The degree certificates are in a common format devised by the university. The name of the college is mentioned in the degree certificates.

#### .3.4 Research and Development

North Lakhimpur College gives emphasis on research in a significant way. The IQAC encourages the faculty to undertake research projects in thrust areas not only at the regional level but also at the national level. The college has the provision of giving study leave to interested teachers to pursue research works leading to Ph.D. or M.Phil as part of Faculty Improvement Programme (FIP). The faculty is encouraged to submit new research proposals and to participate in national and international conferences/symposia and workshops. A considerable number of the teaching staff is actively involved in research. In the session 2014-15 as many as 20 faculty members are involved in Minor Research Project and 1 member in Major Research Project. One member of the teaching staff is availing the benefit of FIP. There is a Research Committee to facilitate and monitor research activity in the College. The externally funded research projects undertaken by the faculty are monitored by the Principal, the funding agency and the Academic Council of the College. Accounts of such projects are audited by the Govt. Auditor and the Accounts Section of the College. The Centre for Social Science Research published its half-yearly e-journal Social Science Researcher regularly. The teachers have their research papers published in many reputed national as well as international journals.

- North Lakhimpur College (Autonomous) has a well maintained and easily accessible library. The library has the SOUL package and barcode equipments besides having computers, Photostat machines and scanners for the users. The users can also benefit from the INFLIBNET facility in terms of books and journals. At present the college library has about 30,774 text books, 17,382 reference books, 80,000 e books, subscription to 39 Journals, 3800 e-Journals, various Magazines, newspapers and 250 CD and Videos.
- All the departments of the college have computers, LCD projectors and computer-related teaching equipments. The large classrooms have been equipped with high-power microphones to aid the teacher just in case they feel that they have to use them for proper teaching. Multimedia LCD projectors are used both in the actual classroom for creating interest in the topic and in the seminar hall for power point presentation. The completion of a central digital class room with all required amenities further strengthened the physical infrastructure of the college. There are weekly seminars in every department and these audio-visual aids have been proved extremely helpful. Moreover, the vocational studies sections of the college, like the Disaster Management or Tissue culture, have more sophisticated instruments to assist both the faculty and the students in pursuit of first hand practical knowledge of the area in focus.
- The college has done its best to ensure that the students can be provided the best of physical infrastructure for their all-round development. It has a sports complex comprising of gymnasium, indoor stadium, playground large enough to accommodate a 100 metre athletic track, basketball court, separate common rooms for boys and girls, 2 girls' hostels and 1 boys' hostel, well equipped laboratories, well stocked library, auditorium that can accommodate about 850 people at a time, Fish breeding tanks, Institutional Biotech Hub, Internet facility, Language Laboratory. Book shop, conference hall, canteen etc.

#### 6.3.6 Human Resource Management

proper academic atmosphere is always present in the institution. The needs of the students and the teachers in relation to the teaching-learning process, which is the most essential component of an educational institution related to the production of quality human resource, are adequately looked after and in case of any complaint that is immediately attended to. The teachers are also inspired to deliver their best to instill curiosity and a sense of investigational desire among the students. They are encouraged to develop leadership qualities along with academic proficiency. Encouragement of teamwork and decentralization are encouraged. Various committees, cells and forums of the college are provided responsibilities for effective downward permeation of the benefits that the institution seeks to provide to the students. Opportunities are provided to the teachers as well as non-teaching staff for professional development. The IQAC has been quite instrumental in the management of Human Resource in the college. The record of Human Resource management in the session 2014-15 is as follows: Two teachers were recruited to permanent posts as per the Government and University Rules and norms which were lying vacant. The management appointed twenty temporary teachers for self-financing and regular courses as per the need. ☐ Selfappraisal mechanism of teachers is in practice. ☐ Welfare schemes for staff as per government norms are available □ Staff development programmes are conducted and teachers are encouraged to participate in International, national and state level workshops/seminars/orientation and refresher courses. 2 faculty members attended Orientation Courses and 6 attended Refresher Courses conducted by UGC. 46 teachers attended national seminars and 7 of them presented papers there while 1 teacher attended and presented papers in International seminars ☐ Teachers are encouraged to pursue doctoral degree and are provided the needed research facilities. The college runs according to Assam Provincialised College Management Act, 2005 and Dibrugarh University rules. Recruitment of faculty and staff is done as per their rules and regulations. Two teachers were recruited to permanent posts in the 2014-15 session. However, the college administration has to recruit temporary teachers and non teaching staff on contractual basis as per the need and as many as 20 teachers were engaged during the current session.

#### 6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The college intends to establish interaction with the industrial sector. But the region being industrially underdeveloped the scope of industrial interaction and collaboration is quite limited. Companies like WIPRO, NIIT etc. have conducted placement sessions for the students in the past but no direct collaboration exists as of now. However the college plans to strike a deal in this regard soon.

#### 6.3.9 Admission of Students

As far as the procedure of admission to various undergraduate courses offered in the college is concerned, public notification is made through newspapers usually in June-July, inviting application for admission. The admission committee of the college decides on the admission criteria for different courses. Admission notices are also hung in the college notice board and posted at the website. Admission forms can be collected personally from the college office during the working hours and such forms can be collected through postal correspondence and from the website as well. An information brochure giving details of the academic requirements for admission to a particular course and of the other documents required for submitting an application is supplied along with the admission form. Admission to the college and the hostels is strictly on merit and subject to approval of the Principal. However, for BCA, admission is made through University conducted Entrance Test and through Common Entrance Test conducted by College for PG Diploma in PTCMP (40%).

Special categories of students, such as, SC/ST/OBC/MOBC/ PH/Sports person are admitted as per govt. rules. Lists of eligible candidates for admission are put up on the college notice board before the day of interview for admission. The selected candidates have to get themselves admitted on the very day of interview. The departments may select students for their respective major courses by holding separate tests. So, admission to the college may not necessarily mean admission into a particular major course. It is noteworthy that the college maintains minimum 45% of cut off marks in the Higher Secondary Exams for the students of general category for admission to degree classes. In the session 2014-15 the total number of students admitted were 1948 out of which 167 belonged to SC, 316 belonged to ST, 994 belonged to OBC and 471 belonged to General category.

- Setting and moderation of question papers, evaluation of answer scripts, scrutiny, tabulation of marks etc. and announcement of results are performed as per North Lakhimpur College (Autonomous) Examination Ordinance.
- Practical Examination of a semester is normally held prior to the End Semester Examination.
- A student is allowed to take the 'betterment examinations' in any two theory courses of any of the six semesters after passing the sixth semester examination only once. In this case, the higher marks secured by the student is to be retained. He/she has to apply for betterment examination within one year of passing the sixth semester examination. No betterment is allowed in practical examinations.
- Any difficulty which may arise in the course of operation of these regulations relating to holding of examinations shall be dealt by the Examination Committee of North Lakhimpur College (Autonomous)

# Analysis of the feedback

Like the previous year, this year also the college has taken feedback from its stakeholders - Alumni, parents, employees and students - in specially designed format. Their opinions were considered for discussion in IQAC meetings and necessary recommendations were forwarded to the concerned authority and persons through relevant channels. The heads of the different departments were entrusted with the task of assessing the students" progress and their response to the faculty and the subject in question. # The two best practices of the year:

#### 1. Book Reading Competition

Objective of the Practice: To culture and strengthen reading habit among students

Need addressed and context: It was seen that most students hardly read any book not mentioned in the syllabus or necessitated by concerns of their programme(s) of study. The Principal, Librarian and members of the Library Committee came up with an idea of encouraging the students to read books at a reasonable pace and form their own ideas after reading.

The Practice: The competition is not compulsory or binding on all students. The students are to pick up any book from the college library. The library authority notes the entry number of

the book against the name of the student borrowing the same for reading. A student has to read and submit a review of the book within the notified time to the Librarian. The winners are given prizes which have a dual impact on the reader: enhancement of reading skills and honing of summarizing skills which are very important for a student in today's highly competitive world.

Evidence of success: The participants in the book reading competition has increased.

Resources required: The practice requires no financial aid other than for buying prizes.

### 2. Girl child adoption

Objective of the Practice: To encourage and ascertain education of girls

Need addressed and context: Efforts like *Beti Bachao*, *Beti Padhao* have shown that the preferential treatment given to boys ends with deprivation on the part of girls. The college feels that it is high time that we do something within our capacity and resources.

The Practice: The College adopts one girl every year belonging to financially weak families with the intention that the college shall pay for her studies at least up to the undergraduate level. The Principal constitutes a committee to select the deserving candidate for adoption. As of now the college pays an amount of Rs. 12,000.00 per year (additional aid may be provided depending on circumstances) to the adopted girls.

Evidence of success: The parents appear happy at the prospect of their daughters becoming graduates in future and many parents have approached the college authority to allow their daughters get the privilege.

Resources required: The practice requires spending a bearable amount of funds.
